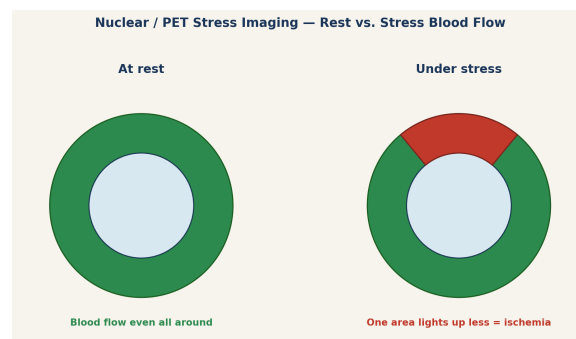


Understanding Your Nuclear Stress Test and Cardiac PET

A tracer plus stress maps blood flow to your heart muscle — to find poor flow and living muscle

It is a stress test with pictures. The pictures show where blood flow falls short.

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Names & Terms You Will Hear

Term	Meaning
Nuclear stress test	A stress test where a tiny amount of a safe radioactive 'tracer' is used to take pictures of blood flow to the heart muscle, at rest and under stress.
Myocardial perfusion imaging (MPI)	The medical name. 'Myocardial' means heart muscle. 'Perfusion' means blood flow. 'Imaging' means pictures.
SPECT	One type of nuclear camera (single-photon emission computed tomography). The most common nuclear stress test.
Cardiac PET	A newer, sharper nuclear camera (positron emission tomography). It gives clearer pictures, uses less radiation, and can measure flow as a number.
Tracer (radiotracer)	The small dose of safe radioactive material given through an IV. It travels with your blood and shows up on the camera. It leaves your body in hours to a day or two.
Stress (exercise or medicine)	Stress means making the heart work harder. You either walk on a treadmill or, if you cannot, get a medicine that mimics exercise.
Ischemia	An area of heart muscle that gets enough blood at rest but not enough under stress. This is the main thing the test looks for.
Viability	Whether heart muscle in a weak area is still alive and could recover if blood flow is restored. PET is very good at answering this.
Coronary flow reserve (CFR)	A number from PET that shows how much blood flow can rise under stress. A low number can mean disease in the large or the tiny vessels.



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What Is Your Nuclear Stress Test and Cardiac PET?

- A nuclear stress test takes pictures of blood flow to your heart muscle. It does this at rest and again when your heart is working hard (stress).
- A tiny dose of a safe radioactive tracer is given through an IV. It travels in your blood. Areas with good flow take up more tracer and look bright. Areas with poor flow look dim.
- Stress is created one of two ways. You walk on a treadmill, or you get a medicine that opens the heart arteries and copies the effect of exercise.
- A special camera takes the pictures. SPECT is the common camera. Cardiac PET is a newer, sharper camera that uses less radiation and can measure flow as a number.
- The doctor compares the rest pictures with the stress pictures. The pattern tells whether flow is normal, low only under stress (ischemia), or blocked from old scar.
- PET can also use a sugar tracer (FDG) to check viability — whether weak muscle is still alive and worth opening up.

At a Glance — The Two Ways to Stress the Heart

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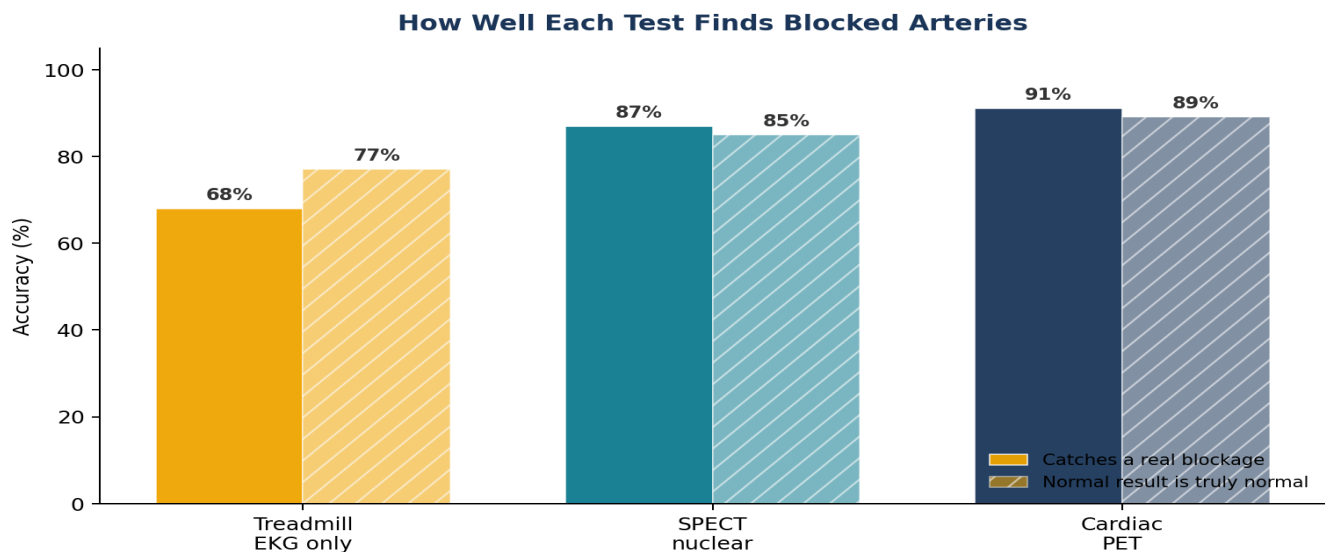
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Why It Matters

- Chest pain, shortness of breath, and a borderline regular stress test are common reasons. The pictures answer a question a plain treadmill test often cannot: WHERE is flow low, and how much muscle is at risk.
- A plain treadmill test reads only the EKG and your symptoms. It misses many real blockages. Adding pictures raises accuracy a lot — see the chart below.
- Cardiac PET is the most accurate of the common stress tests. It finds a real blockage about 9 times in 10, and a normal PET is truly normal about 9 times in 10.
- PET works better than SPECT for people who are larger, who have larger breasts, or who cannot exercise — groups where SPECT pictures can be harder to read.
- The result guides the next step. A large area of low flow may lead to a heart catheterization (angiogram). A normal result is very reassuring and often avoids one.
- PET can measure coronary flow reserve — a number that uncovers disease in the heart's tiniest vessels, which other tests can miss. See our Coronary Artery Disease guide for the big picture.



Adding pictures to a stress test raises accuracy. Cardiac PET is the most accurate of the common stress tests. Numbers are rounded from pooled trial data.



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Normal — Even Flow

- Blood flow looks even all around the heart muscle, both at rest and under stress.
- This usually means no blockage is badly limiting flow right now. It is very reassuring.
- A normal scan often lets us avoid a heart catheterization.
- Care focuses on medicines and lifestyle to keep your arteries healthy.

Reversible — Ischemia

- An area looks dim under stress but normal at rest. The muscle gets enough blood when calm but not when pushed.
- This is the classic sign of a flow-limiting blockage in a heart artery.
- A small area is often treated with medicines first. A large area may lead to a heart catheterization.
- How much muscle is involved matters as much as the blockage itself.

Fixed — Old Scar

- An area looks dim both at rest and under stress. This usually means old scar from a prior heart attack.
- Scar does not improve with a stent because the muscle is no longer alive.
- But not every fixed defect is pure scar — some hold living muscle. PET can tell the difference.
- If PET shows living muscle (a mismatch), opening that artery may help it recover.



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Risk Factors

Some patients are more likely to develop this condition. Knowing your risk helps your care team take extra precautions.

Risk Factor	Why It Increases Risk
Chest pain or pressure with activity	These symptoms can mean a narrowed artery limits flow under stress. Imaging shows exactly where.
Shortness of breath with effort	Can be an early sign of poor flow or weak muscle. The test sorts heart causes from lung or fitness causes.
Known or suspected coronary artery disease	Imaging shows how much muscle is at risk and whether a known blockage is causing trouble now.
Cannot exercise enough to push the heart	Arthritis, leg disease, or poor fitness limit a treadmill. Medicine stress lets the test still be done.
A borderline or unclear regular stress test	Adding pictures clarifies a treadmill result that was hard to read or did not match symptoms.
A weak heart muscle after a heart attack	PET viability imaging shows whether weak muscle is still alive and could recover with a stent or bypass.



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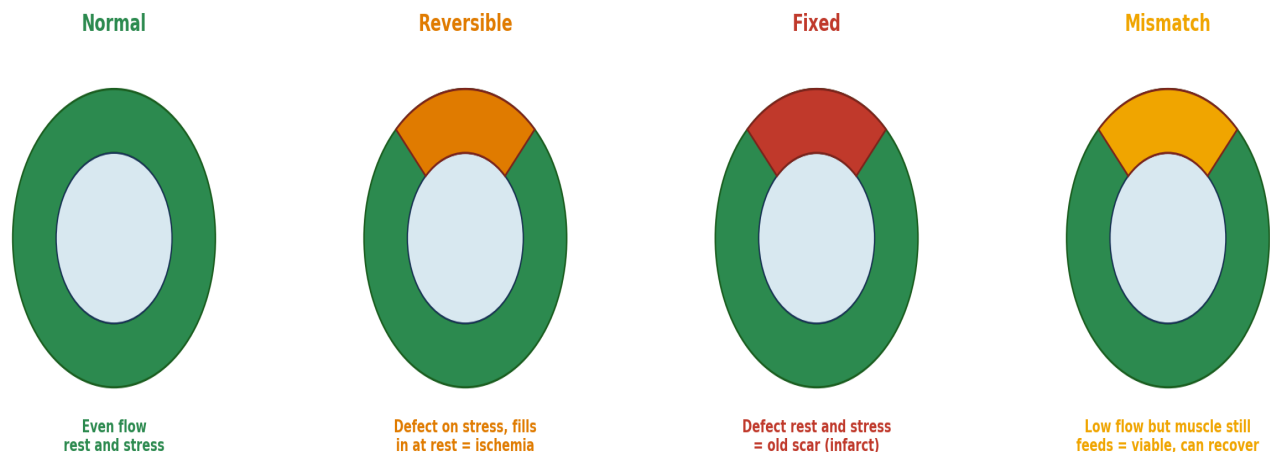


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Treatment Options

- This is a test, not a treatment. Its job is to guide the right care. The result shapes what comes next.
- A NORMAL scan is reassuring. It usually means no large blockage is limiting flow now. Care focuses on medicines and lifestyle to keep it that way.
- A small area of low flow is often managed with medicines first — such as aspirin, a statin, and drugs that ease the heart's workload. This matches the ISCHEMIA trial, where medicines did as well as early stenting for many stable patients.
- A LARGE area of low flow, or low flow in a high-risk spot, often leads to a heart catheterization (coronary angiogram). If a tight blockage is found, a stent or bypass may follow.
- If PET viability shows living muscle in a weak area, opening that artery (stent or bypass) can help the muscle recover. If the area is mostly scar, opening it helps less.
- Either way, the team treats the root causes: blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar, smoking, and weight. See our Stress Test guide for how this test fits the bigger workup.

Four Picture Patterns — What the Scan Can Show



The four patterns the doctor looks for. 'Reversible' means ischemia. 'Fixed' means old scar. 'Mismatch' on PET means the muscle is still alive.



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What Each Result Pattern Means for You

Pattern	What the pictures show	What it usually means
Normal	Even flow at rest and under stress	No major blockage limiting flow now. Reassuring.
Reversible	Low flow under stress, normal at rest	Ischemia — a flow-limiting blockage. May need more testing.
Fixed	Low flow at rest and under stress	Old scar from a prior heart attack.
Mismatch (PET)	Low flow but the muscle still takes up sugar	Muscle is alive (hibernating). It may recover if flow is restored.



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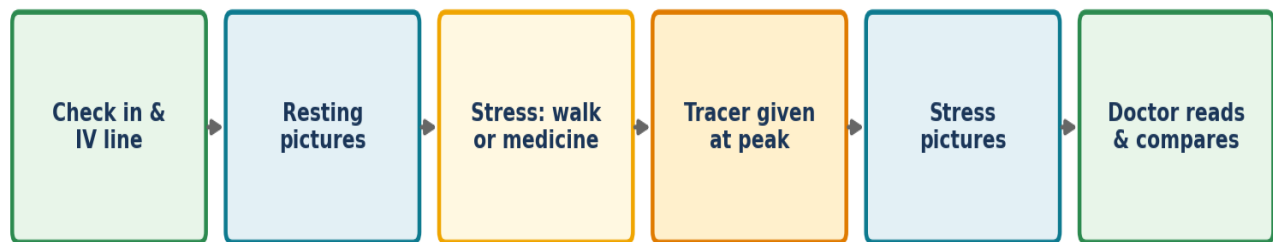


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Comfort Measures at Home (No Medication Needed)

These simple steps support healing and ease symptoms. Use them alongside any medication your doctor prescribes.

- Wear loose, comfortable clothes and walking shoes in case you use the treadmill.
- Follow the caffeine rule. Skip coffee, tea, soda, chocolate, and decaf for about 12 to 24 hours before. Caffeine blocks the stress medicine and can ruin the test.
- Ask which heart and lung medicines to hold and which to take. Bring a list of all your medicines.
- Eat lightly or fast as instructed. For a PET viability scan, you may get special diet steps to prepare the sugar tracer.
- Plan for a 2-to-4-hour visit with waiting time between picture sets. Bring a book or music.
- Drink water afterward and move around. This helps your body clear the tracer faster.



Whole visit usually takes 2 to 4 hours, with waiting time between picture sets.

A typical nuclear or PET stress visit, step by step. Plan for 2 to 4 hours with waiting time between the rest and stress pictures.

The caffeine trap: Caffeine blocks the most common stress medicines (regadenoson, adenosine, and dipyridamole). Even one cup of coffee, tea, soda, or DECAF in the 12 to 24 hours before can make the test fail and force a repeat. When in doubt, skip it and ask us.



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Risks, Benefits, and Alternatives

Every choice has trade-offs. Use this table to start the shared decision conversation.

Option	Risks	Benefits	Alternatives
Cardiac PET stress imaging	Brief tracer radiation. Short side effects from stress medicine (flushing, headache, shortness of breath). Not offered everywhere; cost.	The most accurate common stress test (about 9 in 10). Lower radiation than SPECT. Can measure flow as a number and check viability. Best for larger bodies.	SPECT nuclear test. Stress echo. Plain treadmill test. CT angiogram. Heart catheterization.
SPECT nuclear stress imaging	More radiation than PET. Pictures can be harder to read in larger bodies. Stress-medicine side effects.	Widely available. Accurate (about 85 in 100). Shows where flow is low and how much muscle is at risk.	Cardiac PET. Stress echo (no radiation). Plain treadmill test. CT angiogram.
Stress with medicine (regadenoson, adenosine, dipyridamole, or dobutamine)	Short-lived flushing, headache, chest tightness, shortness of breath. Rarely, slow heart rate or a tight chest. A reversal drug is on hand.	Lets people who cannot exercise still get the test. Opens the heart arteries to reveal limited flow.	Exercise on a treadmill (preferred when you can). No stress at all (rest-only pictures, limited use).
Heart catheterization (coronary angiogram)	An invasive procedure. Small risks of bleeding, vessel injury, contrast effects on kidneys, and rarely stroke or heart attack.	The clearest look inside the arteries. Can fix a blockage with a stent in the same visit.	Stress imaging first (this test). CT angiogram. Medicines alone for stable disease.



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Common Misconceptions

Myth	Reality
The tracer is dangerous radiation that stays in my body.	The dose is small and is gone quickly. A PET tracer fades in minutes to a couple of hours. A SPECT tracer clears over a day or two. The amount is similar to other common scans, and PET uses less than SPECT. Drinking water helps clear it.
A nuclear stress test is the same as a regular stress test.	A plain stress test reads only your EKG and symptoms. The nuclear test adds pictures of blood flow. That is why it finds far more real blockages, as the accuracy chart shows.
If I cannot walk on a treadmill, I cannot have this test.	You can. A medicine given through the IV copies the effect of exercise by opening the heart arteries. The pictures are just as useful.
A normal scan means my arteries have no plaque at all.	Not quite. A normal scan means no blockage is badly limiting flow right now. You can still have early plaque. That is why lifestyle and medicines still matter. A coronary calcium score or CT angiogram looks at plaque itself.
PET and SPECT are the same test with different names.	They use different cameras and tracers. PET is newer and sharper. It gives clearer pictures, uses less radiation, can measure flow as a number, and reads better in larger bodies.
A 'fixed defect' means nothing can be done.	A fixed defect often means old scar. But PET viability imaging can show if some of that muscle is still alive (a 'mismatch'). Living muscle may recover if blood flow is restored.
The stress medicine will give me a heart attack.	Serious problems are very rare. The common effects — flushing, headache, a short tight chest, or shortness of breath — pass in minutes. A reversal drug and trained staff are right there.



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Possible Complications

Knowing what can go wrong helps you spot problems early. Most complications are uncommon, especially with treatment.

Where / What	What Can Happen
Stress medicine side effects (regadenoson, adenosine, dipyridamole)	Flushing, headache, an urge to breathe deeply, a short tight chest, or lightheadedness. These usually pass within minutes. A reversal drug (aminophylline) is on hand if needed.
Slow heart rate or heart block	Some stress medicines can briefly slow the heartbeat. Staff watch your EKG the whole time and treat it quickly if it happens. It is uncommon.
Breathing tightness (asthma or COPD)	Adenosine and regadenoson can tighten the airways. Tell the team if you have asthma or COPD. They can use dobutamine or exercise instead, or have rescue treatment ready.
Tracer radiation	A small, brief radiation dose. PET uses less than SPECT. The benefit of a clear answer outweighs this small exposure. Tell the team if you are or might be pregnant.
IV site issues	Minor bruising, soreness, or rarely a small leak of tracer under the skin. This is usually mild and settles on its own.
A rare serious heart event	Because the test stresses the heart, a heart attack or dangerous rhythm can rarely happen — most likely in people who already have severe disease. Trained staff and emergency equipment are right there.



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Points to Know

If you remember nothing else, remember these key points.

- This is a stress test with pictures. It maps blood flow to your heart muscle at rest and under stress.
- It looks for ischemia: muscle that gets enough blood at rest but not under stress. That is the sign of a flow-limiting blockage.
- Stress is either exercise (treadmill) or a medicine through the IV that copies exercise. Both work well.
- Cardiac PET is the most accurate common stress test, uses less radiation than SPECT, and reads better in larger bodies.
- PET can also check viability — whether weak muscle is still alive and worth opening up.
- Skip caffeine for about 12 to 24 hours before, including decaf. Caffeine can ruin a medicine-stress test.
- A normal scan is very reassuring and often avoids a heart catheterization. A large abnormal area may lead to one.
- The tracer dose is small and leaves your body within hours to a day or two.



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When to Call Us - and When to Call 911

If you are not sure, call. We would rather hear from you twice than miss a real problem.

- Chest pain or pressure that does not go away, or spreads to the arm, jaw, or back — call 911.
- Severe shortness of breath, fainting, or a cold sweat — call 911.
- A fast, pounding, or very slow heartbeat that does not settle after the test — call us today.
- Lasting headache, flushing, or chest tightness more than a few hours after the stress medicine — call us today.
- Redness, swelling, or pain at the IV site that worsens — call us this week.
- Any new or worsening symptom you are worried about — call us. We would rather hear from you twice than miss a real problem.
- Questions about your results or the next step — call the office; we will walk you through them.
