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Names & Terms You Will Hear

Term	Meaning
Mitral valve repair (MVr)	Surgery to fix a leaking mitral valve. It uses your own valve tissue. It does not replace the valve.
Annuloplasty ring	A support ring. It is sewn around the valve's opening. It helps the valve flaps close well.
Mitral regurgitation (MR)	Leaking of the mitral valve. Blood flows backward into the upper heart chamber. Repair fixes this leak.
Sternotomy	The traditional surgery cut. It goes down the breastbone. It gives the surgeon full access to the heart.
Mini-thoracotomy	A smaller cut between the ribs. It is on the side of the chest. It does not touch the breastbone.
Robotic-assisted repair	Mini-thoracotomy surgery done with robotic arms. The surgeon controls them. This allows very small cuts.
Heart Team	A group of heart doctors. They review hard or unclear cases together. They pick the best plan for you.
Leaflets	The two flaps of the mitral valve. They open and close with each heartbeat. They let blood flow one way.
Anticoagulation	Blood-thinning medicine. After repair, this is often short-term, about 3 months. Some patients only need aspirin.
Recurrent mitral regurgitation	A leak that comes back after repair. It can happen years later. Regular echo tests watch for this.



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Know the warning signs after heart surgery. Call 911 for chest pressure or pain, or sudden severe shortness of breath. Do not drive yourself. Check your incision every day. **Call our office the same day** for fever over 101 degrees, or redness, warmth, or drainage from your incision. If someone collapses and is not breathing normally: **call 911, push hard and fast in the center of the chest (100-120 beats a minute, to the beat of 'Stayin' Alive'), and use an AED if one is near.** An AED checks the heart rhythm first. It will not shock a normal heart.



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Recovery After Mitral Valve Repair?

- Mitral valve repair fixes a leaking valve. It uses your own valve tissue. No artificial valve is placed.
- Most repairs use an annuloplasty ring. This ring is sewn around the annulus, the valve's natural opening. It helps the two leaflets meet and close fully again.
- There are two ways to do this surgery. One is sternotomy, a full cut down the breastbone. The other is mini-thoracotomy or robotic repair, a smaller cut between the ribs.
- Doctors prefer repair over replacement when possible. Repair keeps your own valve. It also helps the heart pump better over time.
- Hard or unclear cases go to a Heart Team. Surgeons, cardiologists, and imaging doctors review them together. They pick the safest plan.
- Recovery has two parts. First, your incision and chest heal. Second, you follow a long-term plan with regular echo tests.

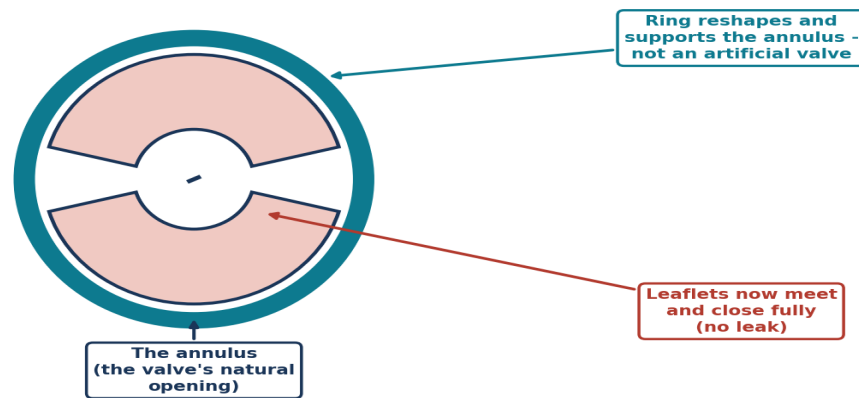
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Annuloplasty Ring Repair - Your Own Valve, Reshaped and Reinforced



The ring goes around the annulus, the valve's natural opening. It helps the leaflets meet and close fully. Your own valve does the work; the ring is just a support.



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Why It Matters

- Repair keeps your own valve. This often means a stronger heart pump than an artificial valve gives.
- Most repair patients avoid lifelong blood thinners. This is different from a mechanical valve, which needs lifelong warfarin. The exception is if you also have atrial fibrillation.
- The ring is not a permanent fix by itself. Good incision care, activity limits, and echo follow-up help the repair last.
- An irregular heartbeat after surgery is common. Knowing this ahead of time can ease your worry if it happens.
- Cardiac rehab, slow activity build-up, and attention to your mood all help you get back to normal life.

Two Surgical Approaches - Choosing With Your Heart Team

Sternotomy	Mini-thoracotomy / robotic
• Full breastbone incision • Best access for complex repairs • 6-8 week bone healing • No lifting over 5-10 lb while healing	• Small side incision between ribs • Robotic arms (like da Vinci) add precision • Breastbone is not touched • Often a faster return to activity



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Risk Factors

Some patients are more likely to develop this condition. Knowing your risk helps your care team take extra precautions.

Risk Factor	Why It Increases Risk
Lifting too soon after sternotomy	The breastbone takes 6 to 8 weeks to heal. Lifting more than 5 to 10 pounds too soon can hurt the healing bone.
Ignoring incision redness or fever	Wound infection is rare but serious. Catching it early makes it much easier to treat.
Stopping a blood thinner on your own	Even a short course of blood thinner has a purpose. Stopping early can raise your risk of a clot.
Skipping follow-up echo tests	A leak can come back without any symptoms at first. Scheduled echo tests catch problems early.
Untreated irregular heartbeat after surgery	New atrial fibrillation is common and usually treatable. Left untreated, it can raise stroke risk.
Smoking or high blood pressure	Both slow wound healing. High blood pressure also adds strain on the repaired valve.



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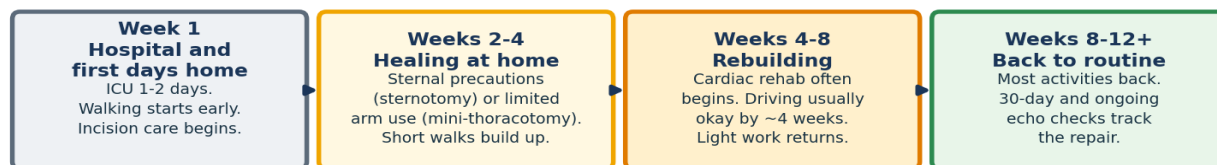


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Treatment Options

- Follow your incision-care instructions closely. They differ for sternotomy versus mini-thoracotomy or robotic surgery.
- Take any blood thinner exactly as prescribed. Most patients need it for about 3 months.
- Keep every echo appointment. You will have one before discharge, one around 30 days, one around 1 year, and then regular checks.
- Start cardiac rehab when your team clears you. It safely rebuilds your strength and supports your heart.
- Follow sternal precautions if you had a sternotomy. Do not lift over 5 to 10 pounds. Do not push or pull. Hug a pillow when you cough.
- Tell us right away about a new irregular heartbeat, fever, or wound changes. Both are easier to treat when caught early.
- Keep every follow-up visit. We use them to check your healing and clear you for driving, work, and exercise.

Recovery After Mitral Valve Repair - A General Roadmap



Sternotomy healing runs about 6-8 weeks for the breastbone; mini-thoracotomy and robotic repair usually recover faster.

A general recovery roadmap. Sternotomy takes longer to heal. Mini-thoracotomy and robotic repair often allow a faster return to activity. We set your exact pace with you.



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Getting Back to Life After Mitral Valve Repair - General Timelines

Activity	Usual timeline	What to know
Light walking	Day 1-2 after surgery	Short walks start in the hospital. Build up slowly at home.
Driving	About 4 weeks	Per your surgeon's OK. Do not drive on strong pain medicine.
Lifting over 5-10 lb (sternotomy)	Wait until 6-8 weeks	This protects the healing breastbone. Mini-thoracotomy patients often clear sooner.
Return to a desk or light job	4-6 weeks	Often sooner after mini-thoracotomy or robotic repair.
Heavy lifting or hard physical work	8-12 weeks, after clearance	We check your healing first before you go back to hard labor.
Sexual activity	Usually 2-4 weeks	Safe for most once you can climb two flights of stairs with ease.
Air travel	Usually after your first follow-up visit	Most can fly by 2-4 weeks if recovery is on track. Confirm with us first.



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Incision Care - Sternotomy vs. Mini-Thoracotomy / Robotic

- Sternotomy: keep the incision clean and dry. Check it daily for redness, warmth, or drainage. Watch for any clicking or shifting at the breastbone.
- Sternotomy: follow sternal precautions for 6 to 8 weeks. No lifting over 5 to 10 pounds. No pushing or pulling. No driving until cleared.
- Sternotomy: hug a pillow firmly against your chest when you cough, sneeze, or laugh. This supports the healing bone.
- Mini-thoracotomy or robotic: the rib incision is smaller, but still check it daily for redness, drainage, or more pain. Brief numbness near the cut is common.
- Mini-thoracotomy or robotic: expect limited use of your arm and shoulder on that side for a while. Ask your team about your exact limits.
- Both approaches: shower only as your surgeon directs, often after your first follow-up. Do not soak the incision in a bath or pool until it is fully healed.



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Blood Thinners After Repair - Short-Term, Not Lifelong

- Most patients take a blood thinner for about 3 months after repair. Some are managed on aspirin alone.
- This short course helps your heart heal and rhythm settle. It is not the same as the lifelong warfarin needed after a mechanical valve.
- The exception is atrial fibrillation. If you also have AF, your blood thinner is often lifelong. That follows separate AF guidelines, not the repair itself.
- If you take warfarin, you will need blood tests (INR) to keep your dose safe. Some patients use a different blood thinner instead.
- Never stop a blood thinner on your own, even if you feel well. Call us first if cost or side effects are a problem.

Repair is not replacement. Most patients do not need lifelong warfarin. A blood thinner is usually taken for about 3 months, or just aspirin is used. This is very different from a mechanical valve, which needs lifelong warfarin. The one exception: if you also have **atrial fibrillation**, your blood thinner is often lifelong. That is for the AF, not the repair.



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Risks, Benefits, and Alternatives

Every choice has trade-offs. Use this table to start the shared decision conversation.

Option	Risks	Benefits	Alternatives
Mitral valve repair with a ring	Surgical risks like bleeding or infection. A small chance the repair does not hold and needs a second surgery.	Keeps your own valve. Very durable for most patients. Usually avoids lifelong blood thinners.	Valve replacement, or a catheter-based repair called TEER, for higher-risk patients.
Sternotomy	The breastbone takes 6 to 8 weeks to heal. You will have lifting limits during that time.	Gives the surgeon full, direct access. Useful for complex repairs.	Mini-thoracotomy or robotic repair, when your case allows it.
Mini-thoracotomy or robotic repair	Smaller but still real cut-site risks. Limited arm use on that side for a while.	Avoids the breastbone. Often a shorter hospital stay and faster return to activity.	Sternotomy, when your heart anatomy makes it the safer choice.
Short-term blood thinner after repair	Higher bleeding or bruising risk while you take it.	Lowers clot risk while your heart and repair site heal.	Aspirin alone for some lower-risk patients. Lifelong blood thinner if you also have atrial fibrillation.



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Common Misconceptions

Myth	Reality
Mitral valve repair puts in an artificial valve.	No. Repair keeps your own valve tissue. The ring is just a support - it is not an artificial valve.
I will need warfarin for life after repair, like a mechanical valve.	Most repair patients take a blood thinner for only about 3 months, or just aspirin. Lifelong treatment is only needed with atrial fibrillation.
Robotic surgery means no incision at all.	Robotic repair still uses small cuts between the ribs. It skips the breastbone, but it is not cut-free.
If I feel fine, I don't need more echo tests.	A leak can come back with no symptoms at first. The echo schedule catches problems early, even when you feel well.
An irregular heartbeat after surgery means the repair failed.	New atrial fibrillation happens in about 30 to 40 out of 100 patients after this surgery. It is usually a short-term issue, not a sign the repair failed.
Once the ring is in, I never need follow-up again.	Most repairs last many years. But rings can loosen over time. Regular echo tests catch a problem early.
Mini-thoracotomy and robotic repair are unproven.	These are well-studied, established techniques. Skilled centers offer the same repair quality through a smaller cut.



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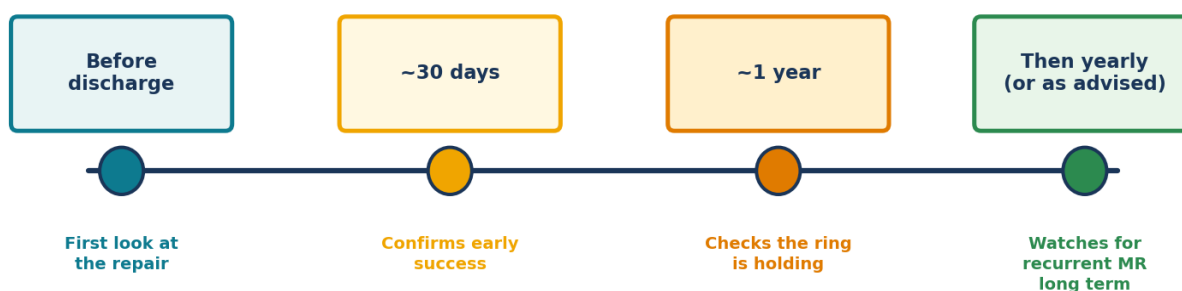
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Possible Complications

Knowing what can go wrong helps you spot problems early. Most complications are uncommon, especially with treatment.

Where / What	What Can Happen
Heart rhythm	A new irregular heartbeat happens in about 30 to 40 out of 100 patients. It is usually short-term and treatable. Rarely, a temporary pacemaker is needed.
The repair itself	In a small number of patients, the leak comes back over months to years. This is why we schedule echo tests. A second surgery is uncommon, needed in about 1 out of 100 patients by 1 year.
Incision and chest wall	Wound infection is rare, well under 2 out of 100 patients. The breastbone can heal slowly if precautions are not followed.
Bleeding and clotting	Blood thinners raise your bleeding risk while you take them. Rarely, a clot can still form.
Kidneys, lungs, and general surgery risk	As with any heart surgery, some patients have short-term kidney strain, fluid in the lungs, or need a blood transfusion. Your team watches closely in the days after.

Echocardiogram Follow-Up: Watching the Repair Over Time



Each echocardiogram checks the ring, the leaflets, and how well they meet.

Echo tests track your repair over time. This catches a returning leak early, often before you would feel any symptoms.



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Repair Durability and Watching for Recurrent MR

- Ring repairs are durable for most patients. Long-term studies show most stay free of a major leak for many years.
- A small number of repairs loosen over time, or a leak slowly returns. This is why scheduled echo tests matter, even when you feel fine.
- Your echo schedule: one before discharge, one around 30 days, one around 1 year, then regular checks after that.
- Watch for signs of a returning leak: new or worse shortness of breath, unusual tiredness, or leg swelling. Tell us at your next visit.
- If a leak returns, options range from watching it closely to a second surgery or a catheter-based repair. We decide this together.

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Emotional Recovery - Mood After Heart Surgery

- Feeling anxious, low, or tired in the weeks after surgery is common. It is a normal response to major surgery, not a weakness.
- Some patients feel foggy or forgetful in the first days to weeks. This usually gets better as you heal.
- A new irregular heartbeat after surgery can add worry. Remind yourself this is common and usually treatable. Ask us questions.
- Watch for low mood, poor sleep, or hopelessness lasting more than two weeks. Tell us - counseling or medicine can help.
- Cardiac rehab often lifts mood. It rebuilds confidence and connects you with others who had heart surgery.
- If you ever have thoughts of harming yourself, call or text 988 right away, or call 911.



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Points to Know

If you remember nothing else, remember these key points.

- Repair keeps your own valve. The ring is a support, not an artificial valve.
- There are two surgery types: sternotomy (full cut, 6 to 8 week bone healing) and mini-thoracotomy or robotic (smaller cut, often faster recovery).
- Blood thinners are usually short-term, about 3 months, unless you also have atrial fibrillation.
- A new irregular heartbeat after surgery is common, happening in about 30 to 40 out of 100 patients. It is usually treatable.
- Echo tests track your repair: before discharge, at 30 days, at 1 year, and then regularly after that.
- Cardiac rehab, slow activity build-up, and attention to your mood all support a full recovery.
- If you had a sternotomy: no lifting over 5 to 10 pounds, no pushing or pulling, and hug a pillow when you cough.
- Call us for wound changes or fever. Call 911 for chest pain, sudden shortness of breath, fainting, or a fast heartbeat that will not settle.



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When to Call Us - and When to Call 911

If you are not sure, call. We would rather hear from you twice than miss a real problem.

- Sudden chest pain or pressure, or shortness of breath that does not ease with rest - call 911.
- Fainting, or a racing heartbeat with dizziness or chest discomfort - call 911.
- Fever over 101 degrees, or redness, warmth, or drainage from your incision - call our office the same day.
- A clicking or shifting feeling at your breastbone - call us right away.
- New or worse shortness of breath, leg swelling, or a sudden weight gain of 2 to 3 pounds in a day - call us.
- Bleeding that will not stop, or unusual bruising while on a blood thinner - call us right away.
- A new irregular or fast heartbeat you notice at home, even with no pain - call us so we can check it.
- Questions about driving, lifting, work, exercise, or sex - call us. These are normal questions, and the answer is different for each patient.

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Warning Signs - Call the Office or Call 911

Symptom	Call the office	Call 911
Mild incision redness or itching	Yes - same day	
Fever over 101 degrees, or wound drainage	Yes - same day	
New fast or irregular heartbeat, no other symptoms	Yes - promptly	
Leg swelling or sudden weight gain	Yes - same day	
Chest pain or pressure		Yes - call 911
Sudden severe shortness of breath		Yes - call 911
Fainting or a racing heartbeat with dizziness		Yes - call 911
Breastbone clicking or shifting		Call 911 if with chest pain. Otherwise call us right away.
